





INTRODUCTION

Carrousel of the Nations is a yearly multicultural event that brings people to ethnic communities to share different cultures.

For the 2003 Multicultural Council launched the theme "Celebrating our Diversity through Art and Culture".

Cultural diversity has been a fundamental characteristic of Canada since its beginnings.

For everyone, in order to survive morally and spiritually, they must know and respect their heritage. The person who ignores and forgets his heritage is spiritually and socially isolated.

This exhibit celebrates our cultural diversity presenting a small part of the rich and colourful Serbian folk art.

The Serbian folk art tradition is as old as the people themselves.

The forces, which shaped the Serbian folk art style, can be traced back to the ancient Slavic roots.

During the long and stormy Serbian history, the elements from other nations, such as Byzantine, Turkish and Central-European have crept into the Serbian folk art.

2 - Serbian Rulers

3a - Pottery

In Serbia, which is the crossways between the East and West, traces of many civilizations are still preserved. The Serbian pottery is traditionally utilitarian.

3b - Jewelry

Jewelry in Serbia was developed by two major factors: economic prosperity and cultural development of the society. During the Middle Ages known as the Golden Age in Serbian history, the leading jewelry was found at the court among those are the signet rings with the insignia of each particular ruler, or earrings, bracelets, broaches and necklaces of their ladies.

4a - Flasks - Cuture

Traditionally, they are used as the containers for the Serbian Sljivovica. It is customary to carry one at weddings and toast to the bride and groom.

4b- Sashes and foot warmers

5 - The ladies folk costume of Montenegro.

6 - Folk instruments

The musical tradition in Serbia is very old, rich and colorful. It has been closely related to the Serbian life and tradition.

7. Woven bags

These popular purses of the Serbian peasants can be found in hundred varieties of colours and designs. In modern times city ladies have used them as well.

8a - Wall hangings

This is one of the 20 wall hangings commissioned by the late King Aleksandar I.

- **9** The old Serbian City costumes. Following the final liberation of Serbia in 1867, the influence of the West seeped into Belegrade and the other cities. However, the affect of the folk costume style was still very strong.

10 - Embroideries

Variety of stitches, threads and designs has been applied on many useful as well as on luxurious items.

11 - Woodcarving

This like in many other artistic expressions of Serbian people, it is applied on a variety of objects.
