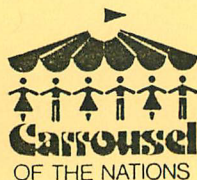

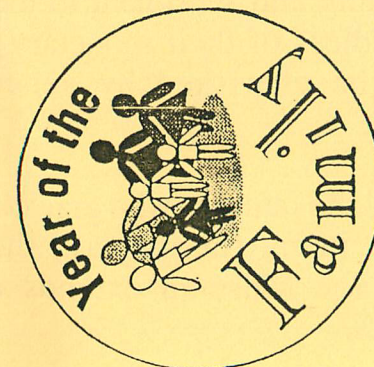

FAMILY TREASURES**

Exhibit : May 7 - August 31, 1994

The Serbian Heritage Museum has prepared this exhibit to mark the International Year of the Family, which is also the theme for this year's Carrousel of the Nations. The exhibit, entitled SERBIAN FAMILY TREASURES, showcases items collected from Serbian families for this occasion.

Family ties have traditionally been strong among the Serb people. These ties are often symbolized by precious family mementos which are handed down from one generation to the next as a symbol of love and a reminder of one's heritage.

Following the two world wars, large waves of Serbian immigrants arrived in Canada. Many were forced to flee their native country and as a result, had to leave most of their belongings behind. Some of the items displayed in the exhibit were obtained during return visits to the homeland or were sent over from the old country. All hold special meaning and sentiment to the families, regardless of their monetary value and will be cherished by generations to come.
